7) When 1.0 g of fructose, C₆H₁₂O₆(s), a sugar commonly found in fruits, is burned in oxygen in a bomb calorimeter, the temperature of the calorimeter increases by 1.58 °C. If the heat capacity of the calorimeter and its contents is 9.90 kJ/g°C, what is q for this combustion? <u>15.642 kJ</u>

8) How much will the temperature of a cup (180 g) of coffee at 95 °C be reduced when a 45 g silver spoon (specific heat 0.24 J/g °C) at 25 °C is placed in the coffee and the two are allowed to reach the same temperature? Assume that the coffee has the same density and specific heat as water. <u>-0.99°C</u>

9) The amount of fat recommended for someone with a daily diet of 2000 Calories is 65 g. What percent of the calories in this diet would be supplied by this amount of fat if the average number of Calories for fat is 9.1 Calories/g? <u>29.58%</u>

12) Equal amounts of heat are used to heat a 25.0 g sample of water and a 25.0 g sample of alcohol. The temperature of the water rises from 23.1°C to 27.9°C, while the temperature of the alcohol rises from 21.6°C to 29.9°C. Calculate the specific heat of alcohol. <u>2.42 J/g°C</u>
13) A piece of glass is heated to 92.3°C and then placed into a 41.3 g sample of water. The initial temperature of the water is 18.9°C, and the final temperature of the water is 20.3°C. Calculate the mass of the piece of the glass. (The specific heat of glass is 0.739 J/g·°C.) <u>4.5 g</u>
